

Expanding Housing Opportunities

As the housing crisis continues to grow so does MI's dedication to offering a solution. For the past 7 years, MI has offered permanent day laborer housing in the community of Redwood City. Thanks to collaboration with community partners, MI has been able to offer day laborers a unique opportunity to live in a welcoming home coined, "*Casa de Paz y Bien*".

We are happy to announce that the San Mateo County Board of Supervisors awarded MI funds for the purchase of "*Casa de Paz y Bien*"! This most important step confirms MI's commitment to providing permanent housing opportunities for the day laborer community in Redwood City. This service also provides day laborers leadership, workforce trainings, vocational skill development and community building opportunities on an ongoing basis.

"I thank MI for their unconditional support during the last few years. You have given me a place to live, work, access computer courses and obtain health coverage.

The opportunity to manage the house has not only increased my confidence, but it has allowed me to develop as a leader in my community."






Revenue




Fiscal Year Ending, June 2018

MI cultivates a mix of financial sources and other resources in order not to be overly dependent on any single source. Programming is sustained by a combination of funding from public sector, contracts, and private foundations and they are augmented by individual donations and in-kind support. Fundraising events close any potential funding gaps and have the additional benefit of engaging our donor base.

Free Dental Services

MI partnered with Onsite Dental Foundation and provided over 150 dental appointments. The dental mobile van was parked in front of MI's Berkeley office for 5 weeks, from the last week of October to the first week of December. Individuals were provided with free cleanings, fillings, tooth extractions and root canals. We look forward to having them back next year.
